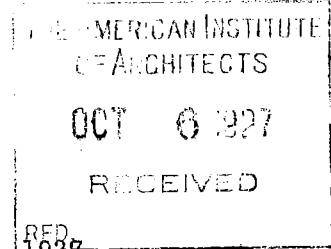

Dear Mr. Kemper:-

It so happens that on October 11th, 1938, I will have attained the age of 70 years and that on November 1st, 1938, I will be automatically retired from the position of State Architect of California after 25 consecutive years in that office, also after about 29 years as I remember it, of continuous membership in the Institute.

It is my understanding that the proposed amendments to the by-laws as set out on page 21 of the March 1936 number of the Octagon, Volume 8, No. 3, under Section 6 of Article 2, were duly adopted by the 68th Convention.

If this is correct I take it that I will be eligible to make application for retirement on November 1st, 1938, on the basis of the information given above and in view of the fact that my dues to the Institute are paid up to December 31st, 1938.

As already indicated I am not entirely certain as to just how long I have been a member of the Institute but believe the 29 years stated above is correct.

If my application is granted it is my understanding that I will be permitted to continue as a "member emeritus" without the payment of dues and that my "interests, privileges, rights, titles and liabilities as a corporate member shall be unabridged and unchanged" because of my exemption.

It is also my understanding that if my application to the Institute itself is granted that exemption from annual dues by retirement shall be effective also in the Chapter and State Association member to which I belong.

I take it that the granting of my application would be conditioned on my refraining from the private practice of architecture following November 1st, 1938, but am not clear on this point.

Will you kindly advise me whether my interpretation of the statements in the March 1936 number of the Octagon are correct, also

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

Dear Mr. McDougall:

Responding to your letter of September 12th:

It appears from the records of The Institute that you will be eligible to be placed on its retired list after October 11th, when you will become 70 years of age. You were elected a member of The Institute in 1909 and have more than the required 15 years as provided in the By-laws.

Retired members are now listed as Members Emeritus, and are exempted from the payment of further dues to The Institute and the chapters to which they are assigned; but such exemption is not extended to membership in state associations. All of the members' rights, privileges and interests are retained as Members Emeritus.

There is nothing in the by-laws of The Institute which requires the Members Emeritus to refrain from the practice of architecture, unless such retirement was granted upon the basis of the applicant's being incapacitated or unable to engage in any vocation. Since your application will be based upon the fact that you have been a member for more than 15 years and have reached the age of 70 years, it would seem that whether or not you continued to practice as an architect would not enter into the matter.

Enclosed is an application for retirement. Please fill it in and return to this office. It will be presented to The Board of Directors for consideration and action at its next meeting, beginning on November 14th.

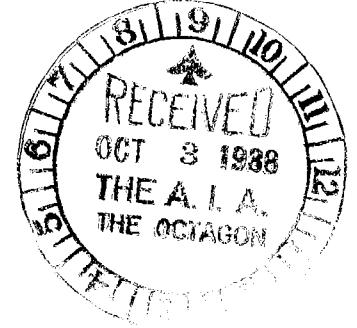

## G. B. McDougall, Architect, Dies

George B. McDougall, former State architect and well known civic figure, died yesterday at San Rafael General Hospital after a brief illness. He was 88.

A native of San Francisco, Mr. McDougall was appointed State architect in 1913 and served until his retirement in 1938.

Among buildings constructed under his supervision were State Buildings in San Francisco and Los Angeles, the Library and Courts Buildings in Sacramento and the Camarill State Hospital in Ventura County.

He was a past president of the northern California chapter of the American Institute of Architects, the Marin County YMCA and the San Rafael Rotary Club. He also was an active Mason and a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Surviving are his widow, Louise, of the family home at 220 Bungalow Ave., San Rafael; a daughter, Mrs. Arthur Dudman, of Sacramento, and a niece, Frances McDougall, of Berkeley.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. Tuesday from the Harry Williams Mortuary, San Rafael. Dr. John Jefferson Canoles, of the First Presbyterian Church, will officiate.

Interment will be at Cypress Lawn Cemetery.
