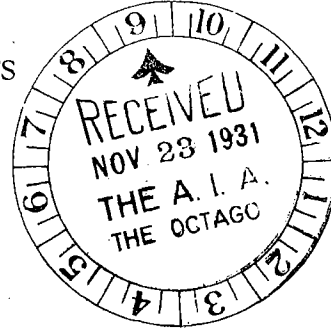

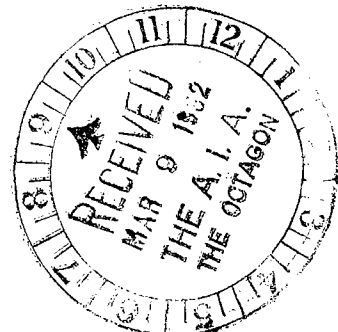

Alfred Shaw, prominent Chicago architect, has been appointed a director of Research Foundation, it was announced today by Park Livingston, president of the board of directors.

Research Foundation is the local non-profit group subsidizing production and distribution of the anti-tuberculosis vaccine, BCG, at Tice Laboratory, Chicago.

Designer of the Merchandise Mart, Field building, Museum of Science and Industry, Florsheim Shoe building, and most recently the Bonwit Teller structure on Chicago's "Magnificent Mile", Shaw is a member of the firm, Shaw, Metz and Dolio, 208 S. LaSalle st. He resides at 64 E. Elm st.

"The purpose of Research Foundation, advancement of the cause of preventive medicine, is one deserving the interest and effort of this city's citizens," Shaw said. "The Foundation is now concentrating its full energies against tuberculosis which annually costs our people \$350,000,000 and kills 50,000 Americans in the prime of life. Through the use of BCG vaccine tuberculosis can be smashed before it starts. The elimination of the White Plague in the United States is our objective."

More than ten million vaccinations of BCG have been given in Europe where the World Health Organization and UNICEF (United Nations International Childrens Emergency Fund) are now engaged in history's largest mass immunization campaign. Twenty-four nations are cooperating in programs which will provide tuberculin tests for fifty million children and young adults in Europe in the near future.

ALFRED SHAW - most outstanding characteristics -- courage ... foresight ... perseverance ... gentleman ... scholar ... genius! Mr. Shaw left behind him many architectural monuments of which the City of Chicago can be proud. To name a few: The United of America Building, Merchandise Mart, Field Building, McCormick Place, Morton Wing of the Art Institute, Continental Plaza Hotel, and the 49-story Mid-Continental Plaza Office Complex now under construction. Also, four air bases and two naval bases in Spain.

In 1919 he was a representative of the inter-allied Food Administration in Central Dalmatia and the American Commission to Negotiate Peace with headquarters in Spalato, Dalmatia, for which he was decorated by the government of Yugoslavia. He was a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, and a governing member of the Art Institute of Chicago and the Chicago Historical Society.

He was a world-wide traveller with lifetime friendships in countries all over the world.

Mr. Shaw has served on National Architectural Juries and lectured throughout the country as well as in Paris where he addressed the "Urbanism" section of the Serenone at the invitation of the Committee on Social Thought of the University of Chicago.
