2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

In 1912 the nominee won a competition for the Lancaster, Pennsylvania, Young Women's Christian Association in competition with Architects of national prominence in this field.

Early in his practice, he became much interested and made careful study of the early architecture of south-eastern Pennsylvania, designing many of his residences in this style and carrying it further in the design of many rural school buildings of the smaller type. These school buildings harmonize and fit admirably into the regional architecture of the section in which they are built.

In 1928, the nominee won the grand prize of \$1,000.00 for the Common Brick School Competition in which 52 school architects throughout the U. S. A. competed. (Ref. Exhibit #2)

One paragraph from the Statement of the Jury of Award (Ref. - Architectural Forum, April, 1929) composed of William B. Ittner, Jr., J. O. Betelle and W. R. McCornack follows:

"After careful consideration of all the schools submitted in the competition, we have selected for the grand prize the design entered by Henry Y. Shaub, of Lancaster, Pa., being that for the Junior High School of Upper Leacock Township, Leola, Pa. This building is representative of schools for smaller communities which, after all, is the type in schoolhouse planning that has been least developed. This school may safely be taken as a model building for the smaller community. Its plan is simple, giving maximum opportunity for those diversified school and community uses which is so necessary when funds are limited. This entry possesses a charm that is rarely found in buildings of this kind. This same building was awarded the first prize in Class A of the competition for smaller buildings."

In the design of school buildings, Mr. Shaub has, at all times, given very careful study and consideration to the aspects of an economic plan using methods and materials to achieve an economic, functional and well-designed building while at the same time always being mindful of the necessity for good construction. His many school buildings standing over a period of years bear forth this fact.

In the school building field, Mr. Shaub has exerted his influence in the reduction of school building costs with relation to required ceiling heights, ventilation, lighting, class room sizes, etc.

He has pioneered in the use of sand blasting to achieve economically, architectural ornament in building stone (Ref. Exhibits #5, 7). He also pioneered in the use of sand blasting in producing ornament on linoleum which also proved very economical. (Ref. Foyer, Exhibit #15)

The nominee was one of the early advocates of the use of color in the class room, also the use of light colored stains in woodwork throughout the school building with the realization of light reflection as a sightsaving factor. These conditions were brought to the front very forcibly throughout the J. P. McCaskey High School (Ref. Exhibit #15) which school has been widely publicized and has received much favorable comment from educators and architects alike.

We believe that the foregoing presents the nominee as one who has shown complete evidence of understanding the concept of regional architecture and, coupled with a sound approach in design, construction, the use of materials, and the economics of building, reveals a deep and sensitive feeling in all matters relating to the practice of architecture.


